Terms and Reasons for Conditions

Under section 88(1)(c) of the EP&A Regulation, the consent authority must provide the terms of all conditions and reasons for imposing the conditions other than the conditions prescribed under section 4.17(11) of the EP&A Act. The terms of the conditions and reasons are set out below.

General Conditions

1	<p>Compliance with Building Code of Australia and insurance requirements under Home Building Act 1989</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. It is a condition of a development consent for development that involves building work that the work must be carried out in accordance with the requirements of the Building Code of Australia. 2. It is a condition of a development consent for development that involves residential building work for which a contract of insurance is required under the Home Building Act 1989, Part 6 that a contract of insurance is in force before building work authorised to be carried out by the consent commences. 3. It is a condition of a development consent for a temporary structure used as an entertainment venue that the temporary structure must comply with Part B1 and NSW Part H102 in Volume 1 of the Building Code of Australia. 4. In subsection (1), a reference to the Building Code of Australia is a reference to the Building Code of Australia as in force on the day on which the application for the construction certificate was made. 5. In subsection (3), a reference to the Building Code of Australia is a reference to the Building Code of Australia as in force on the day on which the application for development consent was made. 6. This section does not apply— <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. to the extent to which an exemption from a provision of the Building Code of Australia or a fire safety standard is in force under the Environmental Planning and Assessment (Development Certification and Fire Safety) Regulation 2021, or b. to the erection of a temporary building, other than a temporary structure to which subsection (3) applies. <p>Condition reason: Prescribed condition under section 69 of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Regulation 2021.</p>
2	<p>Erection of signs</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. This section applies to a development consent for development involving building work, subdivision work or demolition work. 2. It is a condition of the development consent that a sign must be erected in a prominent position on a site on which building work, subdivision work or demolition work is being carried out— <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. showing the name, address and telephone number of the principal certifier for the work, and b. showing the name of the principal contractor, if any, for the building work and a

telephone number on which the principal contractor may be contacted outside working hours, and

c. stating that unauthorised entry to the work site is prohibited.

3. The sign must be—

a. maintained while the building work, subdivision work or demolition work is being carried out, and

b. removed when the work has been completed.

4. This section does not apply in relation to—

a. building work, subdivision work or demolition work carried out inside an existing building, if the work does not affect the external walls of the building, or

b. Crown building work certified to comply with the Building Code of Australia under the Act, Part 6.

Condition reason: Prescribed condition under section 70 of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Regulation 2021.

Condition reason: To ensure all parties are aware of the approved plans and supporting documentation that applies to the development.

Building Work

Before issue of a construction certificate

4	<p>Construction Certificate</p> <p>In accordance with the provisions of Section 6.6 and 6.7 of the <i>Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979</i>, construction works approved by this consent must not commence until:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a) a Construction Certificate has been issued; b) the NSW Planning Portal has been advised of: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (i) the intention to commence work; and (ii) the specific Principal Certifying Authority (building inspector) that has been appointed to the project. <p>Documentation required under this condition must show that the proposal complies with all relevant development consent conditions and is not inconsistent with the approved plans, the Building Code of Australia and the relevant Australian Standards.</p> <p>Condition reason:</p>
5	<p>Section 68 Approvals</p> <p>Before issue of a construction certificate, an approval is required under Section 68 of the Local Government Act for:-</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • water, sewer or stormwater drainage work. <p>Condition reason: To ensure the appropriate section 68 approvals are in place prior to issue of a construction certificate for the development.</p>

Before building work commences

6	<p>Erosion and sediment controls in place</p> <p>Before any site work commences, the principal certifier or Council (where a principal certifier is not required), must be satisfied the erosion and sediment controls in the erosion and sediment control plan which was provided to the principal certifier OR council (where a principal certifier is not required) are in place. These controls must remain in place until any bare earth has been restabilised in accordance with the erosion and sediment control plan.</p> <p>Condition reason: To ensure sediment laden runoff and site debris do not impact local stormwater systems and waterways.</p>
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During building work

7	<p>Discovery of relics and Aboriginal objects</p> <p>While site work is being carried out, if a person reasonably suspects a relic or Aboriginal object is discovered:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. the work in the area of the discovery must cease immediately; b. the following must be notified <ul style="list-style-type: none"> i. for a relic – the Heritage Council; or ii. for an Aboriginal object – the person who is the authority for the protection of Aboriginal objects and Aboriginal places in New South Wales under the <i>National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974</i>, section 85. <p>Site work may recommence at a time confirmed in writing by:</p>
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	<p>a. for a relic – the Heritage Council; or b. for an Aboriginal object – the person who is the authority for the protection of Aboriginal objects and Aboriginal places in New South Wales under the <i>National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974</i>, section 85.</p>
	<p>Condition reason: To ensure the protection of objects of potential significance during works.</p>
8	<p>Procedure for critical stage inspections</p> <p>While building work is being carried out, the work must not continue after each critical stage inspection unless the principal certifier is satisfied the work may proceed in accordance with this consent and the relevant construction certificate.</p> <p>Condition reason: To require approval to proceed with building work following each critical stage inspection.</p>
9	<p>Hours of Work</p> <p>The principal certifier must ensure that building work, demolition or vegetation removal is only carried out between:</p> <p style="text-align: center;">• 7am to 6pm on Monday to Friday AND 8am to 1pm on Saturday</p> <p style="text-align: center;">(No work on Sundays and public holidays)</p> <p>The principal certifier must ensure building work, demolition or vegetation removal is not carried out on Sundays and public holidays, except where there is an emergency.</p> <p>Unless otherwise approved within a construction site management plan, construction vehicles, machinery, goods or materials must not be delivered to the site outside the approved hours of site works.</p> <p>Note: Any variation to the hours of work requires Council’s approval.</p> <p>Condition reason: To protect the amenity of the surrounding area</p>
10	<p>Stormwater Disposal</p> <p>Stormwater from paved and impervious surfaces is to be disposed in a manner that does not cause a nuisance for neighbouring properties, by one of the following methods:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. By piping to the street gutter. b. By piping to a rainwater tank and then via the overflow to the street gutter. c. By piping onto a hardened surface and directed away from the building. d. By piping 3.0 metres clear of any building to a rubble pit. <p>Stormwater infrastructure is to be installed during building work as soon as the roof is constructed.</p> <p>Condition reason: To alleviate any potential stormwater problems with respect to the buildings on the allotment or adjoining allotments.</p>

Before issue of an occupation certificate

11	<p>Occupation Certificate</p> <p>The relevant Occupation Certificate must be obtained before the approved use commences, in accordance with the Environmental Planning & Assessment Act 1979 and to ensure the health and safety of the building’s occupants.</p> <p>ADVISING: Failure to obtain an Occupation Certificate is an offence under the legislation</p> <p>Condition reason: To ensure the building is suitable for occupation (in accordance with its</p>
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	BCA classification).
12	<p>Plumbing and Drainage</p> <p>Any required plumbing and drainage work shall comply with the Plumbing and Drainage Act 2011, Plumbing and Drainage Australian Standard AS3500, Plumbing Regulations 2017 and the Plumbing Code of Australia (NCC 2016).</p> <p>Prior to issue of an occupation certificate, the principal certifier shall be provided with a copy of the Final Plumbing and Drainage Certificate confirming compliance with the <i>Plumbing and Drainage Act 2011</i>.</p> <p>Condition reason: To ensure any plumbing and drainage work complies with the relevant requirements of the Plumbing and Drainage Act 2011</p>

Occupation and ongoing use

13	<p>Swimming Pool - Child Restraint Barrier</p> <p>To comply with the <i>Swimming Pools Act 1992</i> the owner of the premises on which a swimming pool or spa is situated must ensure that the swimming pool or spa is surrounded by a child resistant barrier:-</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • that separates the swimming pool from any residential building situated on the premises and from any place (whether public or private) adjoining the premises; and • that is designed, constructed, installed and maintained in accordance with the regulations and <i>Australian Standard 1926 - 2024 Swimming Pool Safety</i>. <p>Condition reason: To ensure any swimming pool or spa is surrounded by a suitable child-resistant barrier.</p>
14	<p>Swimming Pool Register</p> <p>All swimming pools and spas must be registered with the NSW Swimming Pool Register and feature correct signage, such as an up-to-date CPR sign or “pool under construction” signage permanently fixed within the vicinity of the pool.</p> <p>Condition reason: To ensure any new swimming pool or spa is listed on the NSW Swimming Pool Register.</p>
15	<p>Swimming Pool - Waste water in un-sewered areas</p> <p>Swimming pool wastewater in un-sewered areas is to be disposed to a 10m absorption trench a minimum 900mm deep x 500mm wide incorporating durable self-supporting arch material and covered with 22mm aggregate in accordance with <i>AS 1547-2000 On-site domestic wastewater management</i>.</p> <p>Condition reason: To ensure appropriate disposal of pool wastewater.</p>

General advisory notes

This consent contains the conditions imposed by the consent authority which are to be complied with when carrying out the approved development. However, this consent is not an exhaustive list of all obligations which may relate to the carrying out of the development under the EP&A Act, EP&A Regulation and other legislation. The approved development must be carried out in accordance with the conditions of this consent. It is an offence under the EP&A Act to carry out development that is not in accordance with this consent. Building work or subdivision work must not be carried out until a construction certificate or subdivision works certificate, respectively, has been issued and a principal certifier has been appointed.

A document referred to in this consent is taken to be a reference to the version of that document which applies at the date the consent is issued, unless otherwise stated in the conditions of this consent.

Dictionary

The following terms have the following meanings for the purpose of this determination (except where the context clearly indicates otherwise):

Approved plans and documents means the plans and documents endorsed by the consent authority, a copy of which is included in this notice of determination.

AS means Australian Standard published by Standards Australia International Limited and means the current standard which applies at the time the consent is issued.

Building work means any physical activity involved in the erection of a building.

Certifier means a council or a person that is registered to carry out certification work under the *Building and Development Certifiers Act 2018*.

Construction certificate means a certificate to the effect that building work completed in accordance with specified plans and specifications or standards will comply with the requirements of the EP&A Regulation and *Environmental Planning and Assessment (Development Certification and Fire Safety) Regulation 2021*.

Council means URALLA SHIRE COUNCIL.

Court means the Land and Environment Court of NSW.

EPA means the NSW Environment Protection Authority.

EP&A Act means the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979*.

EP&A Regulation means the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Regulation 2021*.

Independent Planning Commission means Independent Planning Commission of New South Wales constituted by section 2.7 of the EP&A Act.

Occupation certificate means a certificate that authorises the occupation and use of a new building or a change of building use for an existing building in accordance with this consent.

Principal certifier means the certifier appointed as the principal certifier for building work or subdivision work under section 6.6(1) or 6.12(1) of the EP&A Act respectively.

Site work means any work that is physically carried out on the land to which the development the subject of this development consent is to be carried out, including but not limited to building work, subdivision work, demolition work, clearing of vegetation or remediation work.

Stormwater drainage system means all works and facilities relating to:

- the collection of stormwater,
- the reuse of stormwater,
- the detention of stormwater,
- the controlled release of stormwater, and
- connections to easements and public stormwater systems.

Strata certificate means a certificate in the approved form issued under Part 4 of the *Strata Schemes Development Act 2015* that authorises the registration of a strata plan, strata plan of subdivision or notice of conversion.

Sydney district or regional planning panel means Northern Regional Planning Panel.
